

This book sets out a challenge of expectations for church membership: Worship weekly, pray multiple times a day, read scripture daily, regularly be in relationship with other Christians, regularly point people to Jesus, and give generously.

For the season of Lent, we've been focusing on praying multiple times a day. At this point, you've been given 16 different methods of prayer, and hopefully, one or two of them have felt right, and the practice might stick with you beyond Lent and into Easter.

- SRLC received a grant from the NJ SYNOD in the amount of \$1280 for the following three projects: special music for the Longest Night service, ELCA "Yellow Shirts" for members of SRLC to wear for community events, & to bring other local churches to join in worship at outdoor services at the Pavilion at Lebanon Township Memorial Park. A spending report is due to SYNOD in August.
- SRLC's readiness in the event of Pastor testing positive or being exposed to COVID was discussed.
- Short term & long term goals were established.
- The proposed 2022 budget has been adjusted based on input from the December 2021 council meeting.

- The Annual Meeting is scheduled for Sunday, January 23, 2022 (snow date, January 30), immediately following worship service.
- Gene Armbrecht is proposing a June timeframe to coordinate "Music under the Carriage House". Details to follow.

- The financial audit volunteers are now available and working to establish a schedule.

Now, as we enter Easter, I want us to move from prayer to worship. As I said at my call interview way back when, I'm neither a "high church" nor "low church" kind of guy. Instead, I buy into the theory of "The Central Things." That is, if you go back to descriptions of worship in the Gospel of Luke and the earliest descriptions of Christian worship as found in the writings of Justin Martyr and the Didache, you'll find there are several things we've been doing in worship since the beginning—these are central to how we worship and as such, we ought to worship in ways that highlight them. By my count, there are seven central things in worship: Gathering, Baptism, Confession and Forgiveness, the Word of God, Thanksgiving, Meal, and Sending.

When we regularly attend worship and do these central things here, we are practicing for the rest of our life; what we do on Sunday spills out into the rest of our week.

- We practice gathering in church so we don't fall for the isolating, individualistic, and divisive impulses that can come rather naturally in our society.
- We are regularly reminded of our baptismal identity— Children of God, Beloved, Named, and Claimed by God so that when other identities get hung on us, they don't weigh us down or define us too fully.
- We practice confession and forgiveness because both are hard to do. It is easy to hold a grudge and withhold grace. It is easy to define others by their last mistake and hold onto our own guilt.
- We read, tell, and hear the stories of God through scripture, sermon, and creeds so that we don't forget them. There are so many stories out there, some good, some bad, many just noise. Just think, the average American is exposed to at least 4,000 advertisements each day. That's a lot of stories defining who you are and what matters in life!

- We practice giving thanks in church, because so often our impulse is to consider what we lack. Gratitude is genuinely transformative—couples who thank each other regularly are more able to have difficult conversations with each other; writing a meaningful thank you note to another person decreases the likelihood of developing depression for a month and increases a sense of general wellbeing for up to six months.
- We come to the Lord's Supper for a physical reminder of God's love, to receive the body of Christ, and the blood of Christ. We do this to balance out the hate and pain in this world, the bombs and bullets, the pink slip or the sign of cancer.
- We are sent out into the world every week; the church is an organization that exists not for itself but for others. We are sent out to be God's body in the world, and to meet God out in the wide world as well, entertaining angels unaware. To practice what we preach. Those seven bullet points are a lot, right? Well, fear not!

On one hand, you can always go to this YouTube link to review what the seven central things are, and, on the other hand, the Thursday/Sunday Bible Study group will be taking five sessions to unpack these ideas together. That Bible Study should be starting on April 28th. If you'd like to join us just let me know!

Righteous Recipes

Applesauce Cake

1/2 c soft shortening

2 c white sugar

1 very large egg (1/2 cup)

11/2 c applesauce

21/2 c sifted flour

I 11/2 t soda

11/2 t salt

3/4 t cinnamon

1/2 t cloves

11/2 t allspice

1/2 cup water

1/2 cups walnuts (chopped)

1 cup raisins (cut up)

Grease & flour 9" x 13" oblong pan.

Cream together shortening and sugar until fluffy.

Beat egg in thoroughly.

Sift together flour, soda, salt, cinnamon, cloves, and allspice.

Stir in dry ingredients alternately with water.

Stir in walnuts and raisins.

Pour into prepared pans.
Bake at 350 degrees for
45 to 50 minutes or until
cake tests done.

Cool and finish with cream cheese icing or desired topping.
