February 8, 2022

- For this Lenten season, the focus will be on prayer. Two ways to pray will be presented each week.
- Additional volunteers are needed for all Worship & Music opportunities.
- A Gnome making craft event was proposed.

- Quotes are being obtained for window replacement in Pastor's office and one classroom.
- Having Sunday School during worship service is working well.
- The ELCA Youth Gathering is cancelled for 2022. Synod is working to establish an alternate local event.
- Having SRLC host a children's event for the community was suggested. Further discussion will take place.
- Having council members resume counting of Sunday offering will be discussed.
- Resources are available to conduct the financial audit.

March 8, 2022

- Annual NJ Synod Assembly will be held May 5th & 6th via ZOOM.
- Pastor will be on vacation April 18th – April 24th.
- Additional music will begin to be added back into the service.
- Transition to receiving communion at the railing will begin after Easter.
- Sharing of peace will not be reintroduced at this time.

North Hunterdon Food Pantry

The biggest change the Food Pantry must resolve is the elimination of plastic and paper bags for packing clients food selections. Currently, the pantry received a six month extension before we are required to stop using paper and plastic bags. We hope to update our distribution of food to clients by packing in boxes and allowing the clients to pack their food in their own reusable bags. We have some donations of reusable bags to distribute to clients that forget their bags or cannot afford to purchase.

We are thrilled that Boy Scout Troops 121, 200, and Cub Scout Pack 190 brought 3200 pounds of food to our pantry. We have our dedicated volunteers sorting the donated items by dates and finding a spot for all the food. The special Easter distribution went well with the clients receiving a ham donated by ShopRite along with vegetables, fruit, and rolls to complete their Easter dinner. In that same visit, they picked up their monthly requested pantry items.

We are so grateful and thankful for the continued support we receive from our community.

"The Fundamentals" by
Lyman Stewart) or a rule
book for secular governance
(for example, John Calvin's
brief theocratic rule of
Geneva), but as Lutherans,
we believe Scripture
testifies to Jesus Christ and is
the basis for the teachings of
our faith. When we read the
Bible it strikes us a Law and
Gospel, naming both the
reality of sin in the world and
the even greater reality of
God's love for us.

Now, for those who haven't done a lot of Bible reading, it can be a disorienting experience. That's because the Bible is not so much a book, but a library. It is a library filled with all kinds of different documents, all describing God's ongoing faithfulness, each in their own unique way. A deed of sale (Jeremiah), a **Government Proclamation** (Ezra), a Travelogue (Acts), a Hymnbook (the Psalms), **Apocalyptic Literature** (Daniel and Revelation), a Cosmic Court transcript (Job), and Poetry (almost every book in the bible) all pointing us to God's good acts among people.

In addition to being disorienting, reading scripture can be daunting, especially for people who endeavor to read the entire bible. How do you even do that? The same way you eat an elephant, one bite at a time. If you read about three chapters a day (except Psalm 119, it requires a day unto itself), you'll have read the whole bible in a year!

Regular reading of scripture reinforces the Christian story. These days that is incredibly important. You see, since the internet came into widespread use, the average American engages with 4,000 stories a day (some as simple as "buy our shampoo and everything will be good in your life"). This glut of stories can swamp the good news about God's love found in Jesus Christ. Making sure the biblical stories are part of your daily consumption of stories, is vital for a strong faith life.

Righteous Recipes

Strawberry Spinach Salad

For the Dressing:

1/3 c. extra-virgin olive oil

1/4 c. fresh lemon juice

3 tbsp. honey

1 tbsp. apple cider vinegar

1 tbsp. poppy seeds

2 tsp. dijon mustard

1/2 tsp. salt

1/4 tsp. ground black pepper

In a small jar, combine the olive oil, lemon juice, honey, vinegar, poppy seeds, mustard, salt, and pepper. Seal the jar; shake vigorously to combine. Set aside.

For the Salad:

2 5-oz. containers baby spinach

1 lb. strawberries, halved or sliced

2 oranges, peeled and sliced

1 1/2 c. chopped pecans, toasted

4 oz. goat cheese, crumbled

Just before serving, add the spinach to a large bowl or platter; top with half of the strawberries and orange slices. Drizzle with half of the dressing; gently toss to coat. Top the salad with the remaining berries, orange slices, pecans, and goat cheese. Drizzle with your desired amount of the remaining dressing, and serve the remainder on the side, if you like.

Erik, Richard and Pastor Chris worked hard to prepare our garden to be able to provide the North Hunterdon Food Pantry with fresh vegetables.


