North Hunterdon Food Pantry

The North Hunterdon Food Pantry monthly client count continues to vary. We continue to add new families each month. Weather has played a large part in families arriving to collect food. We have reached out to some families to ensure that they know that we are available. Fortunately, our communities and organizations continue to support the pantry with food drives and monetary donations. We have a very good relationship with the Voorhees Key Club and we continue to update and notify each other of any emergency needs. The Boy Scouts have also contacted us numerous times with food drives, volunteer work they can perform, and Eagle Scout projects.

We provided the nurses at all of the local grammar schools and high schools with the food pantry schedule to share with their district families. Hopefully, with the children going back into the schools, the schools nurses will be able to reach out to the families about the services we can provide.

The reverse Advent Calendar food drive was a success and something that we will organize again next holiday season.

In addition to the monthly distributions in November and December, we were able to provide each family with a complete holiday meal for both Thanksgiving and Christmas. This was possible through the generosity of ShopRite, the congregation and other donations. The holiday distributions included everything; the turkey, canned vegetables, canned fruit, fresh celery, potatoes, carrots, stuffing, gravy and a ShopRite gift card to enable them to purchase dinner rolls and desserts.

Karen and I had a chance to visit the Flemington Food Pantry and the Open Cupboard food pantry in Clinton. We exchanged some ideas with each pantry and viewed how they handled some situations, particularly the handling of food distribution during this panademic. We are happy to report, we are all basically following the same method of distributing food.

We are thankful for our steady crew of dedicated, reliable and hard working volunteers and are pleased to announce the addition of several new members in recent months.

Palm/Passion Sunday

Scripture: Mark 11:1-11

Prayer:

Sovereign God, you have established your rule over the human heart, not by force but by the servant example of Jesus Christ. Move us by your Spirit to join the joyful procession of those who confess Christ Jesus with their tongues and praise him with their lives. Amen.

Object: Plant

So, please take a moment to look around your house for a house plant, or alternatively, poke your head outside and grab a branch. Hold the plant, lift it up in the air, think back to that day, Jesus entering into Jerusalem, the crowd doing just as you have done. When you have that moment clearly in your mind, shout "Hosanna!", which means "Save us!"

Reflection: The Donkey Makes All the Difference

My shorthand for what Lutherans call "Theology of the Cross" is "The Donkey Makes All the Difference." Jesus rode into Jerusalem as conquering king on a lowly donkey; this really tells us everything we need to know about our Lord! It is a small example of a larger truth about him, he short circuits every idea of power and authority we, and every society and culture in existence, may have. From cradle to grave to beyond the grave, Jesus shows us a God who has so little to do with "god" as we wish to conceive of divinity. Our God is always revealed in weakness, always in cross—because the donkey makes all the difference.

Righteous Recipes

Lemon & Oregano Baked Shrimp

18 oz. Tail-on shrimp

2 cloves garlic

2 T mayonnaise

1 t whole dried oregano

1 c long grain white rice

1 lemon

1/4 c sour cream

1 lb broccoli

11/4 c Panko breadcrumbs

2 T butter

Pre-heat ovent o 450F.

Cut broccoli into small florets, drizzle with 2 T of olive oil, season with salt and pepper and toss to coat. Spread in an even layer in a large baking dish. Roast 12 minutes. Leaving oven on, remove from the oven.

In a medium pot, combine rice, big pinch of salt and 2 cups of water. Heat to boiling on high. Once boiling, reduce the heat to low. Cover and cook, without sitrring 13 to 15 minutes, or until the water has been absored and rice is tender. Turn off heat and fluff with a fork.

Peel and roughly chop 2 cloves of garlic. Quarter and deseed lemon. Melt the butter in a medium bowl in the microwave (or melt in a small pot on the stove). Add the chopped garlic, breadcrumbs, oregano,mayonnaise, 1 T of olive oil, and the juice of 2 lemon wedges. Season with salt and pepper and stir to combine.

Pat the shrimp dry with paper towels, Place in a bowl. Drizzle with olive oil and season with salt and pepper; toss to coat. Carefully place the seasoned shrimp in an even layer on top of the roasted broccoli. Evenly sprinkle the breadcrumb topping over the prepared shrimp and broccoli. Bake 11 to 13 minutes, or until the breadcrumbs are toasted and the shrimp are opaque and cooked through. Remove from the oven.

Meanwhile, in a bowl, combine the sour cream, 1T of water, and the lemon juice of remaining lemon wedges. Season with salt and pepper. Serve the baked shrimp and broccoli over the cooked rice. Top with sauce.

Maundy Thursday

Scripture: John 13:1-17, 31-35

Prayer:

Eternal God, in the sharing of a meal your son established a new covenant for all people, and in the washing of feet he showed us the dignity of service. Grant that by the power of your Holy Spirit these signs of our life in faith may speak again to our hearts, feed our spirits, and refresh our bodies. Amen.

Object: A Kitchen Table

Take a moment to sit at your kitchen table. Think back... What meals have you had here? Who has joined you in them? Friends? Family? Hold onto those feelings and images that come to mind. Then consider that "last supper" Jesus had with his disciples—with his companions, even his betrayer. Consider too, the awesome meal he offered there—a remembrance of Passover, Jesus was a good Jew after all, and also a remembering of Passover; he put together that story of salvation afresh, in his own flesh and blood!

Reflection: Every time you wash your hands today recite—"Love One Another"

Throughout the day today, as you wash your hands (and we're doing a lot of that these days, aren't we?) recite those words Jesus spoke "Love one another." They interpret the washing of his disciple's feet and are his command for those who follow him to do the same. "Love one another."

Good Friday

Scripture: John 18:1-19:42

Prayer:

Grieving God, on the cross your Son embraced death even as he had embraced life: faithfully and with good courage. Grant that we who have been born out of his wounded side may hold fast to our faith in him exalted and may find mercy in all times of need. Amen.

Object: Hammer and Nail

If you can, find a hammer and nails. Consider them at noon today. Consider that such tools were once used to execute people, execute, in fact, the Son of God. This act exposes us outright—God came in the flesh, forgiving us continually, and we killed him, but it also exposes God's heart for us—we killed his Son, and he took it as a sacrifice for Sin, including the sin of murdering that very same son. Thanks be to God!

Reflection: Crosswalk

If able, take a walk. Look around for crosses. No really! You'll be surprised, telephone poles, cracks in sidewalks, trees, crosses everywhere!

Easter

Scripture: John 20:1-18

Prayer:

Resurrecting God, you conquered death and opened the gates of life everlasting. In the power of the Holy Spirit, raise us with Christ that we, too, may proclaim healing and peace to the nations. Amen.

Object: A Napkin

Find a napkin. Roll it up and set it in front of you. A small sign, isn't it? It only hints at what is to come, resurrection! May this napkin be a small sign for you today, as we celebrate the resurrection of Jesus Christ!

Reflection: Keep Showing Up

One of the requirements for doing internship at St. John's, Pimlico in Baltimore, where I did my internship, was attending open NA meetings at least once a week, so the intern knew more fully the troubles of our neighbors. People would share their story and their ongoing struggles with drug addiction, and at the end we would all circle up and lock arms and remind one another to "Keep showing up."

And when you think about Mary, on that first Easter, that's what she was doing.

Why was she the first to the tomb? Because she kept showing up. Why was she first to hear our Lord's voice? Because she kept showing up. Why was she the first to proclaim the Gospel of Jesus Christ? Because she kept showing up.

What courage it takes, to keep on in the face of it all! Friends in Christ, Keep showing up!

Altar Guild

Liturgical Colors of the Lutheran Church

"What do the different colors in the church represent?"

The church seasons are celebrated with traditional colors that evolved in the early Roman Catholic Church. Color, like music, plays an important role in the life of God's worshiping people. Just as music is the "handmaiden to theology," liturgical color compliments the message of the seasons and occasions during the church year.

Traditionally, five basic colors (scarlet, green, black, red and white) are used in liturgical congregations.

Blue is used during the season of Advent. Advent begins the liturgical year for four Sundays before December 25th. Blue, the color of the sky, helps convey the message that our faith rests on the hope that Christ, who came in the flesh will also return on the last day of time from that same blue sky he ascended long ago.

Christmas is our celebration of the birth of Jesus. The color for the season of Christmas is gold or white, representing Joy, Innocence, and Holiness. Jesus is the Word of God who became one of us, the promised Messiah. The Christmas season begins on Christmas Eve and ends the Sunday after January 6th which commemorates the Baptism of Jesus.

Green is the color used during the times after Pentecost; the times when the Gospel scripture lessons focus on the teachings of Jesus. The readings during this season instruct us on how to live out our Christian faith in our daily lives. Green is a sign of hope for triumph of life over death.

Purple is used during the season of Lent. Purple is a color that was reserved for use by royalty, and so it is used in Lent to symbolize the time of Jesus' trial when the Roman guards put an old purple robe over him and hailed him as "King of the Jews." Purple is also symbolic of Reflection and Penance. Lent is the time of preparation for Easter, the greatest season of the Church. During Lent, we are asked to focus on changing our lives through prayer, penance and love. In doing this, we try to become more like Christ in His Love for God and others by His dying and rising to new life.

The Lenten season begins on Ash Wednesday and ends on the Thursday of Holy Week. From the time of the early Church, the 40 days of lent are counted from the first Sunday in Lent until Holy Thursday, called Maundy Thursday, with Sundays excluded from the total. Like the season of Spring, Lent is a time of renewal. The cross symbolizes Jesus' victory over death and the Hope of our salvation.

Black is seen very seldom during the year. Usually, it used only twice; on Good Friday and Ash Wednesday. There's no mistaking the message that his sober color gives. Black represents the absence of light.

Good Friday, in combination with Ash Wednesday, calls for sober reflection on the cost of our redemption.

In the Easter season, white is the color used. It is the symbol of purity and completeness. White also reminds us of the passage "though your sins be as scarlet, they shall be white as snow." Christ's triumph from the grave on Resurrection Day is the cause for our rejoicing. His purity before his Father becomes our purity. White reinforces that message of joy.

Gold is the optional color for Easter Sunday. It is also the suggested color for the last Sunday in the church year called Christ the King Sunday. Gold represents value and worth. The Resurrection of Jesus Christ is the event that gives our lives meaning and worth.

The symbols for Easter are the Paschal Candle and water which represents the light and new life of Christ's resurrection and the water of our baptism and rebirth. The Easter Season flows from the Easter Vigil and concludes fifty days later on Pentecost Sunday.

On Pentecost Sunday we celebrate the coming of the Holy Spirit. On this day red is the liturgical color, representing the fire of the Holy Spirit. Red is a power color and is used on Reformation Sunday, and on festive occasions such as Dedications, Ordinations, and Installations of a Pastor.
