About 8 years ago, The Lily Foundation surveyed nearly every congregation in America and discovered that the biggest determent for Pastors to perform good ministry was the burden of seminary debt.. So, they invested some real money into paying down seminary and bible college debt across denominations (they partnered with everyone from the Russian Orthodox to Independent Pentecostals) with a program called the National Initiative to Address **Economic Challenges** Facing Pastoral Leaders. Within the ELCA, Lilly partnered with two Synods that were as different as can be, the Southwestern Minnesota Synod (home of Laura Ingalls Wilder) and the New Jersey Synod (home of

A Message from the Council President

You may have noticed a new green and white donation bin for new and almost new clothes and linens in the lower parking lot. This is a new addition as a result of a partnership we have entered into with American Recycling Resources (ARR). They are a "for profit" company who works with non-profit organizations that provide locations for their bins. In exchange for using our space, they will pay us each month for using our space. So in turn, it becomes a charitable endeavor since we benefit from the monthly income which will be in the neighborhood of \$50 to \$75 per month.

ARR will come on a regular basis to empty the bin and will come as needed if we notice any abnormal items being left or if the bin is full before the normal pickup. We don't have a long term commitment to this program, but Council felt we should be open to new sources of revenue and we can gain \$600+ per year with little time or investment on our part. We will evaluate the effectiveness of the program in about six months to determine if we want to continue this long term.

American Recycling Resources has existed for 20 years and has operated this program for around 7 years. They work with charitable organizations such as St. Vincent DePaul in Maryland and Children's Specialized Hospital in Lakewood where they donate new and almost new clothing. And they work with a variety of organizations and industries to recycle the clothing and goods that they collect.

I hope you will help to support this new project by donating your used clothing and linens.

North Hunterdon Food Pantry

It has been a pretty quiet summer for the food pantry. We continue to distribute about 2700+ pounds of food per month to approximately 35 families which consists of about 65 adults and 30 children . Karen was fortunate enough to have school age volunteers bag our clients selections all summer. and had a group clean up some of the weeds we had on the patio and some of the old boxes on the sidewalk. This really improved the appearance of the pantry. We were very lucky to have someone donate two new air conditioners to the pantry. We are very fortunate now to have an air conditioner in each room.

We are now again required to have inspections in the pantry

to obtain our licenses. We had the new Norwescap Senior Director, the State of New Jersey Department of Agriculture, and the Administrative Assistant and Food Sourcing Network Manager from Norwescap all walk through and inspect our pantry. We are proud to say that each department that visited had only compliments for our pantry. We have been required to obtain an exterminator. We also had a **SNAP** (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program) representative visit and assist our clients for a couple of months, explaining the program and actually signing clients up to the program and then following up the next month with the clients.

In the next couple of months we will be preparing for the holiday distributions.

Please follow us on Facebook 'North Hunterdon Food Pantry' for new food drives and events that we are taking part in, If you know of anyone that might be in need of assistance, please have them contact the pantry. We turn no one away if you are in need.

Family Promise

We completed our second summer hosting week, and we were able to extend our assistance to the quests in the Family Promise program by covering an additional unclaimed summer week. Great job everyone! Because FP was in a week of turn over, we were only needed to supply one family with grocery gift cards for the week of August 13. Of course, we had collected enough support for multiple families, so we offered to supply gift cards for the next available open week, which was September 10th.

For the week of September 10th, we again provided gift cards for just one family, leaving us with a surplus of cards and money. I contacted the FP office to ask what needs they had that we may be able to fill. They responded by saying that they support families from the program for a year after they move into their new home and are in need of grocery gift cards and gift cards to buy school clothes. As a team effort of Spruce Run Lutheran Church, St. John Neumann Church and Thrivent seed money, we were able to provide \$400 in ShopRite gift cards and \$400 towards the purchase of school clothes. FP was extremely appreciative.

- Quote received for outdoor security camera.
- Quote received for improved video capability.
- The "Fund for Mission" grant requirements are being reviewed.
- VBS will be done in partnership with High Bridge Reformed Church. Details to follow.
- There will be 2 outdoor services during the summer – July & August. Both will be held at Finn Road Park in Pittstown.

Bruce Springsteen) to create a program called Excellence in Ministry Unleashed (EMU). Since then EMU has shifted its focus to assisting clergy and congregations with managing, and talking about, money. This last week I attended a continuing education event put on by EMU that was led by Bonnie Ives Marden who wrote the book, or at least a book, on church finances and best practices for stewardship. It was an intense event that started by focusing on putting together a list of projects that need funding or other resources, who might have some of those resources. and what exactly we should ask those people for. Then Mrs. Marden threw us all for a loop; she gave us 20 minutes to contact as many of those people as possible and do the ask we had written downright there the event went from a theoretical exercise to an in the trenches act of ministry. Now there were 50 Rostered Leaders at this event. In those 20 minutes, we ended up asking for \$134,000 of money and in-kind donations! And that was the major take away from the event-you gotta do the ask!

And even before this event, we

as a congregation exercised those ask muscles. We'd received a matching fund grant from EMU, if we raised \$5,000 EMU would pitch in \$7,000. Lisa and I started us off by giving a 10th of what we needed, \$500, and you all were incredibly generous; in just a few weeks and with a single ask and a follow-up letter, we raised the remaining \$4,500! With that money, we are able to: replace the rain damaged windows in the office and a classroom, install a security system that fits the recommendations by the local police after the break-in, and upgrade from using cell phones to tape worship to a less intrusive camera system. On top of that, I'm heading off to another continuing education event run by Partners for Sacred Places. This organization's focus is helping historic congregations: identify and lean into the ways our congregation matters to the community we are in, find partners who share our values (both religious or secular) to share our building with, and do all of this without losing sight of who we are and how we are called by Jesus to be in ministry here. The Council and I hope this conference will

answer some questions we have about protecting the congregation's tax exempt status while also using some of our unused space more creatively and sustain our congregation well past our 250th anniversary. In summary, I'm bringing back information to the council and the congregation at large, that will help us ask in a faithful way that encourages generosity, and discern how to share ourbuilding in ways that are legal and consistent with our identity.

SEASONAL PSALMS

This year we will be singing Psalm 25 for the 4 Sundays in Advent. Since Rob Ossi has had experience doing this in other churches, he has written a summary of how this can be effective in a church service.

Psalms are the Word of God - pure Scripture. The Book of Psalms is the songbook of the Bible, and the Holy Spirit is the songwriter. As a boy, Jesus would have memorized and learned many if not all of the Psalms. Our congregation is what we sing!

Benefits of Using Seasonal Psalms:

- Using a seasonal Psalm for several consecutive weeks, depending on the length of the season, enables the worshiper to learn and memorize the Scripture referenced in that particular Psalm.
- Enables the worshiper to embrace the beauty of the music set to that seasonal Psalm, bringing out the richness of Scripture and offering us a more authentic picture of God.

- Allows the congregation to gain a vast amount of Scripture stored in their minds and hearts, the DNA of peoples' lives.
- Worshipers will be able to participate fully with the rest of the congregation in singing the psalm, even without any books or worship aids, since they have come to know that Psalm - as opposed to using the Psalm setting of that day which is often new territory where worshipers tend to focus more on just getting through the technical

logistics of the Psalm rather than having more meaningful and deeper experience.

- Worshipers will find themselves humming and/or singing the Psalms outside of church on Sundays.
- Worshipers will quickly learn the scripture and musical setting, making it truly a "sung prayer."

Recipes from the Congregation

Pumpkin Dump Cake

1 (29 oz) can pumpkin purée

- 1 (12 oz) can evaporated milk 3 large eggs
- 1/2 c packed brown sugar
- 1t ground cinnamon
- 1/2t ground ginger
- 1/4 t ground cloves
- 1/2t salt

1 (15.25 oz) pkg spice cake mix 1/2 c coarsely chopped pecans 1/2 c melted butter

1. Preheat oven to 350 F. Grease 9" X 13" pan.

2. Combine pumpkin, eggs, evaporated milk, and both sugars in a large bowl. Stir in cinnamon, ginger, cloves and salt. Pour into prepared pan. Sprinkle dry cake mix evenly over pumpkin filling. Sprinkle pecans over cake mix.

Drizzle melted butter over top.

3. Bake in preheated oven until edges are slightly browned, 50-60 minutes.

4. Cool.

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Whole-Food, Plant-Based Recipe Swap & Tasting Guidelines

What to bring:

Whole-Food, Plant-Based Food to Share

All dishes must be made only from plant ingredients No animal products (meat, fish, eggs, dairy, cheese) No added oil, salt, sugar, syrup, honey, and/or other sweeteners No processed food

Make food for your family/group plus two more servings

If you are not sure if the dish you plan to make is a whole-food, plant-based compliant dish, you can contact me and I will look at the recipe and suggest ingredient substitutions if needed.

While there is some room for other items on the fringe of a whole-food, plant-based diet, for this gettogether, we focus on sticking with the healthiest foods at the core of every plant-based, whole-food diet. The purpose of the swap is to build a collection of tasted, whole-food, plant-based recipes.

Print out the recipe of what you bring that includes all the ingredients in the dish so people with food allergies will know what is in each dish. Also, people can take a picture of the printed recipe with their phone to add to their collection if they wish.

If you are not ready to cook a plant-based dish, bring some washed and ready to eat fresh fruit or vegetables like grape tomatoes, peeled carrots, sliced peppers, broccoli, cauliflower, or some steamed vegetables (fresh steamed or frozen steamed mix).

We want to minimize set up and clean up so bring everything you will need (your own dinner plate, bowl, cup, utensils (eating and serving), napkins, water to drink, etc. and a placemat if you wish). Plan on taking back everything you bring.

Do not plan on using the church kitchen. If you are bringing a hot dish, bring it already heated.

You can invite anyone to come, but be sure they have a copy of the guidelines to be sure we only have whole-food, plant-based compliant dishes.

2023 Reverse Advent Calendar Food Box


