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your heart" judgmenetalism mascaraing as Gospel. It doesn't have to be that way.

Firstly, we can learn to listen! As Dietrich Bonhoeffer once wrote, "The first service one owes to others in a community involves listening to them. Just as our love for God begins with listening to God's Word, the beginning of love for others is learning to listen to them." People have actual life situations where they are encountering God's active role in their life, and want Christian encouragement. If we listen, we'll notice those and be able to point out what God is already doing in a person's life; surely that is good news!

Secondly, we can acknowledge that part of describing our faith is done for ourselves; articulating our faith, however tentatively, strengthens it. When we describe our faith, it moves from an abstract statement into a confession. This is a corollary to listening, we listen and describe what God is doing in our life, and that is much more compelling than any formula or tract or apologetics. After all, the most famous description of the faith— St. Augustine's Confessions, is just that, a confession of what he has experienced of God, not a systematic treatise, but one beggar describing to another where he has found sustenance.

Finally, it is about relationships. Our call is not to swoop in, say a few

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## **Righteous Recipes**

## Cheesy Spinach Artichoke Scoop

#### Ingredients:

- 1 bag Scoops
- 1 jar Tostitos Creamy Spinach Dip
- 8 oz. cream cheese
- 2 oz. heavy cream
- 7 oz. marinated artichokes, chopped
- 1/2 tsp. garlic powder
- 1/2 tsp. onion powder
- 1/2 cup each: shredded mozzarella, parmesan, swiss cheese
- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees.
- 2. In bowl, combine soft cream cheese, heavy cream, and seasonings. Stir until smooth.
- 3. Drain artichoke hearts and add into cream cheese mixture.
- 4. Add spinach dip and cheeses.
- 5. Transfer to a dish and bake for 10-15 minutes, stirring half way through.
- 6. Evenly divide Scoops on serving platter and fill with cream cheese mixture.

## Update on the Fund for Mission Grant

As you might remember, last year we received a Fund for Mission Grant from the Synod. We are using it to re-introduce ourselves to the community, after being without a pastor for a while and going virtual for a portion of the pandemic. We've been able to fund joint outdoor worship services with our full communion partners at Bethlehem Presbyterian, including an upcoming 9/11 Remembrance and Ecumenical Worship service.

We now have "God's Work, Our Hands" T-shirts that we wear to community events. For example, we held an outdoor game night in July and all wore the yellow shirt. A few people stopped by and wanted to know what that was about. If you've not received a T-shirt yet, please talk to Pastor or Karen, we still have some extras for people who didn't put in an order.

Finally, we've contacted, and plan on hiring local cellists to play music at our Longest Night service this year. This should make an already moving worship service that much more special. We are grateful to the Synod for these pieces of ministry that probably would not have happened without the wider church's investment in us. We are also grateful for the people here on the ground who are doing the work that transforms these investments of monies into acts of ministry!

Our donations to Lutheran Disaster Relief provide money and quilts to those in need at home and abroad. In addition, our donations of backpacks and school supplies to Lutheran Social Ministries of New Jersey provided a whole carload of supplies to children who would otherwise not have them. Our reception and use of this Fund for Mission Grant is another example of how these types of partnerships showcase the ELCA's vision of Church; One church, three interrelated expressions of that Church.

### A Re-Constitutional Convention

We recently received an update from the Bishop about the goings on at Churchwide Assembly (CWA) this year. A lot happened in that multi-day meeting in Columbus Ohio, but one of the things that the Bishop wrote about has caught my imagination: "The commission will report to the 2025 CWA with the potential for a reconstituting convention to be called. It has been 35 years since the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America began so it seems time to examine whether what served us well then still holds. I'm excited to participate in this work, especially since change is one our synod's core values."

In Aristotelian ethics there are three things a person or organization needs before doing something: Glasses, a Tool Belt, and a Map. You need Glasses to see the situation you are in. You need the Tool Belt to do the actual work—the types of tools you have limit the actions at your disposal. You need a Map to know where you are going, what you hope to accomplish with your action.

From what I've seen of the ELCA it feels like we've dealt with the Glasses and Map questions. For example, back in 2009 the ELCA did a big self-assessment eventually called "The LIFT document" (Living into the Future Together) and the current Presiding Bishop defined who we are this way: "We are church, we are Lutheran, we are church together, and we are church for the sake of the world." For that matter, our current goal as a denomination is to: "contact a million new people and introduce them to the ELCA as a community of Jesus."

What we've not dealt with, is restocking our tool belt. By that I mean the ELCA's constitution, how we define the rules of the game. The ELCA was formed by a merger of three different forms of Lutheranism, and where there were disagreements we often papered over them, were a little vague, allowed for regional variety, and said, "we'll define that more clearly when we've lived into this arrangement." Well, we've now lived into this arrangement for 35 years, and it might be time to intentionally go through that tool belt: your beloved trusty hammer that you got from your great grandfather—maybe it is time to hang it up on the mantel and replace it with the other one that has less sentimental value and you'll actually use with full force, clean the rust off the screw driver and WD40 the wrench, and buy a whole new tape measure—they have some with lasers now!

As I said, the prospect of a reconstitution convention has caught my imagination. Imagine the ELCA as a confident and self-aware church, newly equipped for the opportunities of 2025, empowering each and every congregation to reach 112 people in our local communities with the Gospel of Jesus Christ!

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nice words about Jesus and swoop out, but to consistently be salt and light for our neighbor. Be Christian in such a way that our neighbors know we're safe and good people to turn to when the Holy Spirit moves them to ask God questions and seek the one who has saved us, Jesus Christ our Lord.

#### Stewardship:

Stewardship can be an awkward subject, and some of that has to do with two competing impulses when the church talks about it. On one hand, part of my job as Pastor is to help you all be generous people, because God has first been generous to you. On the other hand, I need to keep the Churches doors open by meeting our budget. These aren't mutually exclusive things, but the waters can easily get muddied. So, let's talk about both.

It takes approximately \$220,000 a year to run our congregation. Most of that money comes from our offering. So, part of cultivating generosity is encouraging giving to the congregation. My own household will give Spruce Run approximately 11% of our yearly income. Ten percent of a person's income given as a religious offering is in biblical terms, a tithe, which is what the ELCA requires of their ordained leaders. This year Lisa and I gave that extra bit in order to put our money where our mouth is regarding the 110% challenge—as a rule, I'll never ask anything of any of you that I myself won't do. When you have a moment, think through how much you will be giving in offering this year, what percentage of your household income is it?

Consider, in the coming year, if you would be able to increase that giving by a percentage point.

One of our five focuses for the year is "Holistic Stewardship" which was my, perhaps overly complicated, way of saying that stewardship is about our whole life, not just money given to church. Christians are to be generous people; we are to be generous with our time, talents, and possessions. We ought to reflect on how we are stewards of all those things. For example, if there was a 25th hour added in the day, how would you use it? Does your Christian faith shape your answer? It should!

#### Fellowship:

A group of us got together for our game night last week. For two hours or so we spent time together, playing games (everything from Sequence and Scrabble to Hogger Logger and Calico—) casually chatting and generally having a good time. The funny thing is, we were doing more than just having a good time, we were creating social capital—the networks of relationships needed for organizations, and society at large, to function effectively. We grew trust there, together, that night.


Trust is a precious commodity these days. We live in a distrustful world, the chasms between people widening on account of modern tribalism and political polarization, not to mention that so much of life is mediated by the semi-anonymous medium of screens. The church offers a different vision. At that

game night, or look around at any coffee hour, and you'll see the same thing, you'll find people crossing generational, economic, and partisan boundaries!

In addition to the benefits the secular world can see when it looks at the social capital that Christian fellowship creates, there is also a spiritual dimension worth stating. We encounter the Body of Christ when we gather together. We become the Body of Christ in these encounters. As much as our individualistic society might tell us the Gospel is a "me and Jesus" transaction, it is so much more than that. The Gospel is the whole world being reconciled to God through Jesus Christ, and the main place we know we'll see this is in the face of our fellow Christians gathered together.








## Our Mission
